## **Methodology**

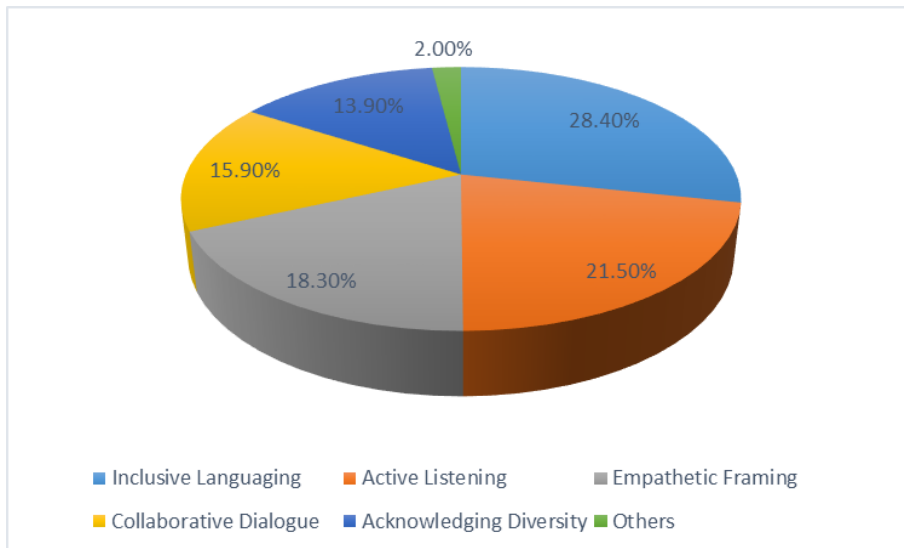

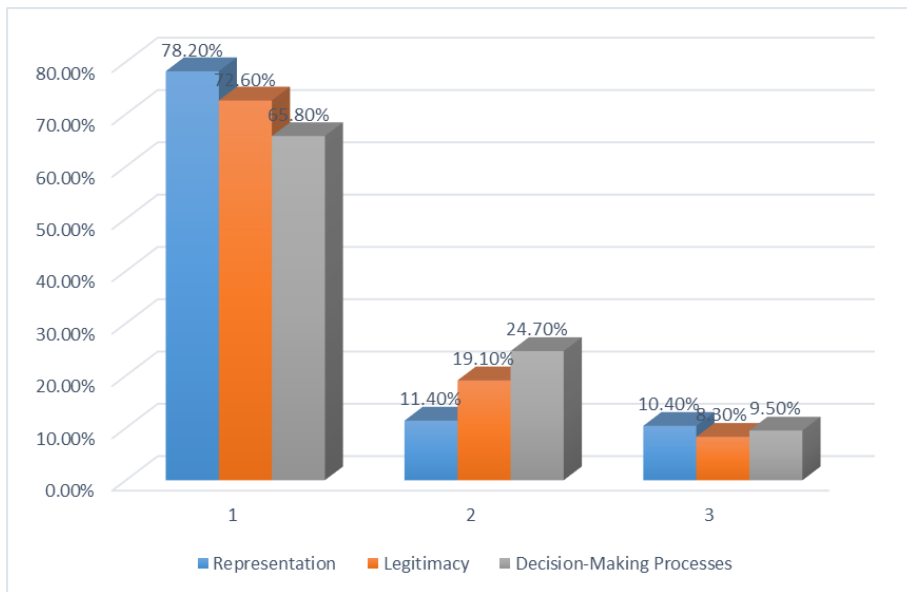

Active listening (21.5%) and empathetic framing (18.3%), which involve understanding diverse perspectives and reframing issues in an inclusive manner, were also prominent. Collaborative dialogue (15.9%) and acknowledging diversity (13.9%) were other significant discursive practices observed.

Table 2: Impact of Inclusive Leadership on Participatory Governance

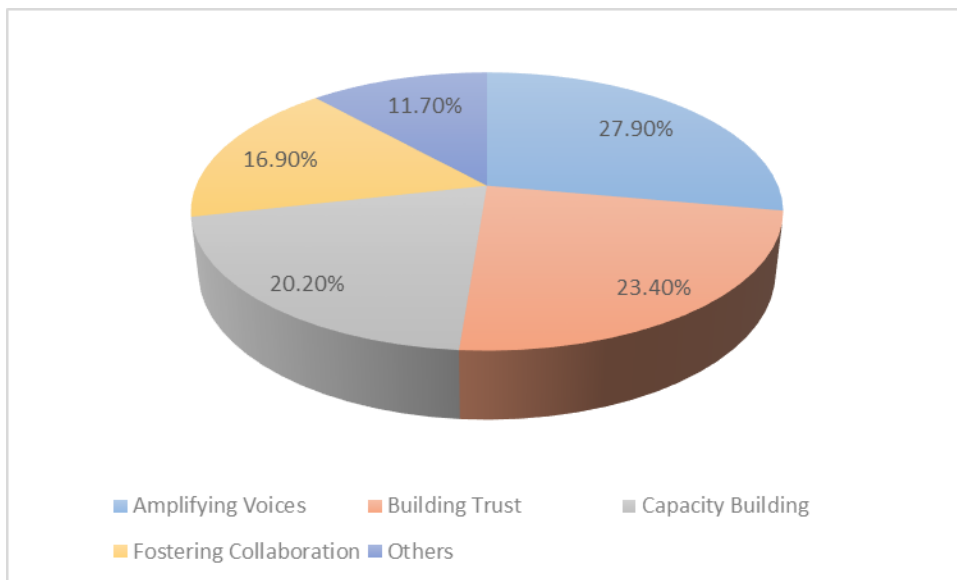

The data in Table 2 reveals that inclusive leadership has a predominantly positive impact on participatory governance. A significant majority of respondents (78.2%) reported a positive impact on representation, indicating that inclusive leadership practices enhance the inclusion of diverse voices and perspectives in decision-making processes. Additionally, 72.6% of respondents noted a positive impact on legitimacy, suggesting that inclusive leadership fosters a sense of trust and credibility in governance structures. While the impact on decision-making processes was perceived as positive by 65.8% of respondents, a notable 24.7% reported a negative impact, potentially due to the complexities and challenges associated with inclusive decision-making processes.

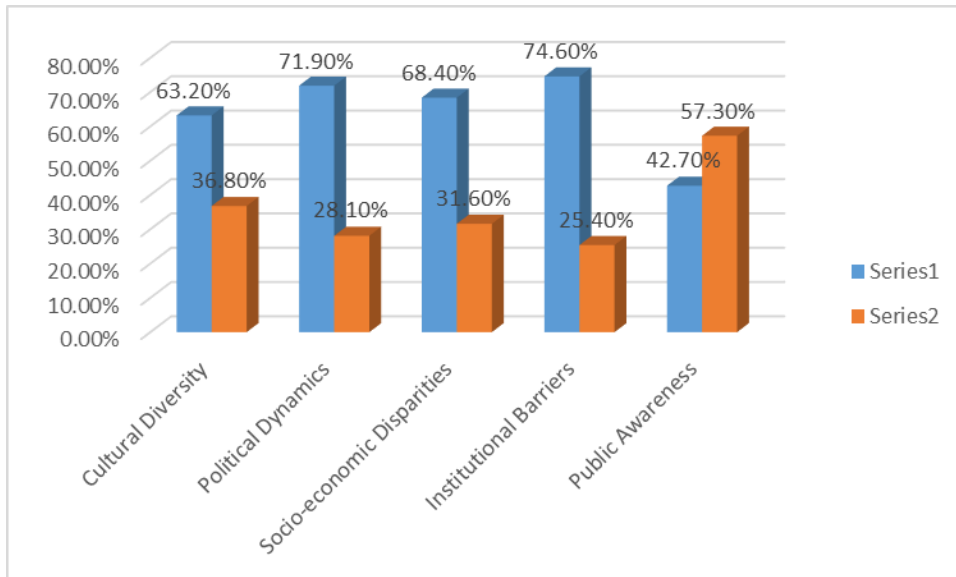

These findings align with previous research emphasising the importance of inclusive communication (Ferdman, 2020; Winters, 2020) and the need for leaders to create inclusive spaces that value diverse perspectives (Nishii & Leroy, 2022; Tapia & Polonskaia, 2020).

Regarding the second research question, the results indicate that inclusive leadership has a predominantly positive impact on participatory governance, particularly in terms of enhancing representation, legitimacy, and decision-making processes. These findings resonate with the literature highlighting the role of inclusive leadership in fostering inclusive organisational cultures (Mor Barak et al., 2022) and promoting equitable representation (Hande et al., 2024). However, the data also revealed some negative perceptions regarding the impact of inclusive leadership on decision-making processes, which could be attributed to the complexities and challenges associated with inclusive decision-making (Bell & Reed, 2022; Kiss et al., 2022).

Addressing the third research question, the study revealed that inclusive leadership plays a crucial role in promoting civic engagement and empowering marginalised communities. Key roles identified include amplifying voices, building trust, capacity building, and fostering collaboration. These findings align with the existing literature on the importance of inclusive leadership in creating opportunities for marginalised groups to participate in decision-making processes (Dinizulu et al., 2024; Nwachi, 2021) and promoting social inclusion (Cerna et al., 2021).

In response to the fourth research question, the study identified both challenges and opportunities in implementing inclusive leadership approaches across diverse cultural, political, and socio-economic contexts. Cultural diversity, political dynamics, socio-economic disparities, and institutional barriers were perceived as significant challenges, which resonates with previous research highlighting the complexities of inclusive governance (Gao & Teets, 2021; Renn & Schweizer, 2020). However, public awareness emerged as a prominent opportunity, suggesting

the need for increased understanding and advocacy for inclusive leadership practices (Egitim, 2022; Jamatia, 2023).

Notably, an unexpected finding was the relatively low frequency of discursive practices categorised as "others" (2.0%), suggesting that the identified practices may capture the majority of inclusive leadership discursive practices in the studied contexts. Additionally, the study revealed a higher negative impact of inclusive leadership on decision-making processes compared to representation and legitimacy, which warrants further investigation into the factors contributing to this perception.

While this study provides valuable insights, it is important to acknowledge its limitations. The study relied primarily on qualitative data, which may limit the generalizability of the findings. Additionally, the cultural and geographical contexts of the study may have influenced the results, highlighting the need for further research across diverse settings. Future studies could explore the intersection of inclusive leadership with other leadership styles, such as transformational or ethical leadership, and their combined impact on participatory governance and civic engagement.

In conclusion, the findings of this study underscore the significance of inclusive leadership in fostering participatory governance, promoting civic engagement, and empowering marginalised communities. The discursive practices employed by inclusive leaders, such as inclusive language, active listening, and empathetic framing, play a crucial role in creating inclusive spaces and facilitating meaningful dialogue among diverse stakeholders. By enhancing representation, legitimacy, and decision-making processes, inclusive leadership contributes to the development of inclusive and sustainable governance structures.

This research has important implications for policymakers, civil society organisations, and leaders at various levels of governance. Investing in inclusive leadership development and integrating inclusive practices into governance frameworks can foster more equitable and inclusive societies. Furthermore, the study highlights the need for continuous efforts to address the challenges and leverage the opportunities associated with implementing inclusive leadership approaches across diverse cultural, political, and socio-economic contexts.
